Feedback Obtained

The institution has taken great efforts with its academic autonomy through a curriculum which identifies and addresses issues related to local, national and global level. efficient Mentoring system through which, a group of students consisting of 810 are assigned to a faculty member. Mentors meet their students and guide them with their studies, extracurricular activities and discuss the roles and responsibilities of mentees'. They also provide tips on balancing professional and personal life. Mentors will coordinate with the parents regarding the progress of the students. They use to give routine advice on balancing of academic, professional responsibilities and counseling, if required. Mentors use to identify initial learning goals of mentees'. Supports the mentee in research arenas and provides recommendations for high profile committees and allows the mentee to try new endeavors. Mentors use to boost the mentee's selfconfidence by being an advocate and providing encouragement. Mentor use to schedules routine, structured meetings for advising mentees and giving direction about their work and future careers. Demonstrates how to manage time and how to train and supervise personnel. Provides regular career development opportunities, such as journal clubs and other forums to facilitate the exchange of ideas. The mentors maintain the biographic details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status. They also maintain record of their class attendance, class performance and academic progress. Assist students in solving problems and when necessary refer them to an appropriate authority or resource person. All students are encouraged to meet with their mentors, on a regular bias to discuss their learning progress including any academic problems encountered. Although each student will be assigned to a mentor, students may seek advice from other academics with when they feel comfortable. Mentors and mentees are expected to meet approximately three or four times per year under normal circumstances. Assist their mentees to gain an understanding of the curriculum, the faculty's expectations of the curriculum, the faculty's expectation of its students and the university's requirements. Students can contact their mentors for any academic or nonacademic support. MTNC mentors share their knowledge, experience and wisdom. They stimulate curiosity and build confidence by presenting new ideas, opportunities and challenges. By providing an open and supportive environment mentors discover talents and interests and help in attaining mentee's goals. Mentor keeps communication open, offers support, defines expectations, maintains contacts, advises them to be honest, innovative and creative, tells them to be reliable and consistent, positive and enthusiastic. The mentors use both formal and informal means of mentoring. The mentor system, apart from its formal part exists as a robust informal mechanism to boost inclusiveness, gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students.

office and in library is properly and regularly serviced under AMC with Professional Marketing Services, Madurai. Electrical and plumbing related work is done with the assistance of local skilled persons and the daily expenditure is met from budget gained by college from different sources. The RO water is provided to the students in all the blocks and the water tank is cleaned every three months. Three incinerator vending machines and three napkin disposal machines are installed in the ladies rest rooms

and this too is properly maintained for the welfare and betterment of the girl students and women faculty members. Every department is interconnected with intercoms. The departments are facilitated with desktops, printers and LCD projectors which are also regularly attended if complaints are registered through proper cannel. The sports department of the college is meritorious. The management has appointed this year a retired physical directress to look after the sports and games of the girl students. Adequate funds are allotted for the purchase of sports equipment and maintenance of apparatus and the sports ground. The running track is used by students, staff and is also accessible for the local community. The management staff maintains the track and field. A stock maintenance register is kept in the physical education rooms to issue the sports items and equipment to the sports personnel. The institution has a fitness center which can be used by boys, girls and the faculty members. Separate time is earmarked for the girls in the gym. The college has got 4 computer laboratories with 454 desktops and 4 science laboratories one for each science department. The instruments are properly maintained and periodically serviced. A band of committed staff under the qualified headship of a Librarian looks after the function of library effectively. Library software is maintained under AMC with Rovan Software, Sivakasi. Disinfecting and keeping library clean is done frequently by the menial staff. Further an MoU is signed with Fire and Safety license that periodically visits the library and fills the gas extinguisher equipment. The institution has got spacious classrooms which facilitate sufficient fans, lights and furniture.

Carpenters and electricians carry out the maintenance. Booking register for all seminar halls is maintained for effective academic usage. A stock register is maintained in every department to record the stock and the consolidated report is submitted to the superior authorities for their reference.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

Every department has a club/association through which programmes like guest lecture, cultural, fest, and quiz... are organized. Students function actively with the key roles as Secretary, Joint Secretary and members of their concerned department's club/ association. They take responsibility and lead the programmes. They promote them as leaders and use the opportunity to improve their stage behaviours, organizational and management skills. They share their opportunity with the other classmates every year as the committee is revised every year. Every class represents a boy and a girl to represent their problems, difficulties and needs to the authorities. The department of English adopted the school Kallar Government Higher Secondary School with the responsibility of helping the students of rural and poor background in their concerned subjects/ courses. The student volunteers visit the school regularly as scheduled with the school authorities and help/ teach them (in) their subjects. They not only extend their volunteer help but also become aware of the society and of their role in the society. The students of Community College (from both Diploma and B.Voc Programmes), BSW and BA English (SF) took a rally from Pasumalai Arch to the Campus of Mannar Thirumalai Naicker College to create awareness against smoking with the thought of creating awareness to the society. It was done with the collaboration of Top Kids on World No Smoking Day. A student representative from every programme represents the views and needs of the students in the BOS meeting. The students prove their role in framing their syllabus too. The members of Rotaract Club, NCC, and NSS extend their service to the society voluntarily. The Rotaract Club of the institution is completely managed by the students' community. A student named Rishi Bakkesh from III BA English had motivated a number of youngsters to assign to donate their organs after their life. The members of Rotaract club collected financial assistance from the society and helped for those affected from Kerala flood. The three NCC Volunters (S. Sukumar, S. Dinesh Kumar and A. Periyakaruppan) participated in the National Integration Camp in Rajasthan between 11.11.2018 and 22.11.2018. The girl student, Ms.Kowsalya participated in the Republic Day Parade in Delhi. Students contribute a nominal amount for the Students Aid Fund every year. The amount is distributed to the needy students of the college. Students contribute to the college magazine regularly with their creativity like poem, puzzles, drawings, cartoons, articles and so on. The students of Computer Application released a periodical magazine REBOOT with the intention of inculcating knowledge related with computer applications to the other students of the same institution.

On the day of 26th January, they visit the college with their family and have a meeting at the department level. Following the meeting in the department level, they gather in the auditorium. With the lead of these representatives, the common meeting is convened in the auditorium in the presence of the Principal, the Secretary and the other members of the Management. They discuss the activities of that year and the plan for the forthcoming year. In the meeting convened on 26.1.2019 the association has planned many activities for the welfare of the college. 416 alumni attended that meeting. They passed a resolution in the meeting to construct to a block with their own fund by December, 2020. It was followed with the cultural and a sumptuous lunch.. Every department has an active presence of an effective alumnus in the BOS meeting. Their valid suggestions are taken into consideration in framing and updating the curriculum. In the academic year 201819, our alumni have contributed Rs. 24,300/ Alumni from the department of Commerce have contributed books worth Rs. 5,153/. CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The Institution practices decentralization and participative management through committees and clubs. The College Administration is systematically decentralized with the sole aim of holding every single stakeholder responsible for the maintenance of standards. Major administrative decisions of the institution are taken in the College Council meeting. Decentralization ensures wider deliberations on the issues and maximum acceptance. Departments are given autonomy in decision making regarding academic programmes and later the decisions are discussed with the Principal for approval. Student's admission is decentralized to respective departments under admission committee headed by the principal. Our institution believes in effective team work and involves each and every member of the teaching and nonteaching in building the institution. The leadership role is developed by assigning responsibilities to all the members of the management, faculty members and students. The management is committed to incorporate new ideas, new suggestions which help both the faculty and students. The members of the management demonstrate their devotion to the institution through active involvement in the overall development of the college. Their suggestions and interactions with teaching and nonteaching staff pave way for the effective and efficient transactions in the teaching and learning process. The Management directs the Principal periodically to carry out strategies and routine activities through delegation and supervision. Accordingly written communication has been sent to carry out the activities recommended by the delegates. The institution decentralizes the college administration by entrusting responsibilities

with the teaching and nonteaching staff. Principal along with the Deans, Heads of the Departments, Controller of Examinations, IQAC coordinator and selected staff members discusses the academic and nonacademic responsibilities, future plans of the departments, new proposals and final resolutions which are taken for implementation. The Principal with the help of senior staff, frames committees, clubs, cells, associations for the smooth functioning of the college. The Principal periodically convenes meetings of various bodies like College Council, HODs, IQAC, Research, POs of extension activities and Convenors of various clubs during the academic year to monitor the activities of the various clubs, functioning in the college. The administrative functions of the institution are carried out by the Head of the Institution through a set of committees in the college. The committees carryout their activities and report the work done at end of the academic year. The HODs convey the decision of the college council in their respective departments. Decisions of the meeting are communicated through circulars to faculty members as well as students. The office administration of the college is headed by the Office Superintendent who in consultation with the Principal coordinates the office administration. As a further measure of decentralization to ensure smooth functioning of the administration, the Management constituted Self Financing Wing with teaching and nonteaching staff. The Director of Self Financing Wing is the functional head carrying out academic responsibilities as a part of administrative decentralization. The Self Financing Wing has separate administrative office with a head clerk. The Management office has one administrative assistant and an estate supervisor who performs secretarial and housekeeping works respectively.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

The primary aim of solid waste management in our institution is to reduce and eliminate adverse impacts of waste materials on human health and environment to support economic development and superior quality of life. Every day all the buildings in our college and other surrounding area in the campus are cleaned and waste is separated out and disposed. All the stationery wastes from the workplace, departments, classrooms, library, and store are disposed for recycling. The blank sides of singlesided printed papers are used for printing samples. Modern Napkin incinerators are maintained in Ladies toilet

rooms in the college and the hostel for safe disposal of napkins. Leaf garbage is gathered and utilized as manure for the growth of plants and trees at our college campus. Wellconstructed drainage system leading to the closed collection tanks is maintained to avoid stagnation of water. The tank is also cleaned regularly. Eight Pittanks are built all around the campus. Hand wash waste water is alone collected in these tanks and it is directed to the plants. Maintenance of water supply, prevention of water leakage and wastage is done regularly. Liquid waste is drained through pipes and connected directly to municipal underground drainage channel.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Title of the Practice: Health Centre and Fitness Centre Objectives of the Practice: • To enhance health consciousness and physical fitness among students • To provide physical fitness equipment in a gymnasium under the care of the Director of Physical Education • To provide health tips daily in health centre notice board. • To assist during medical camps and blood donation camps conducted in the college periodically. • To provide medical service for menstrual hygiene women and general health of both men and women. • To provide counseling and guidance on mental well being through professional counselors when necessary through a mental health specialist. • The ultimate objective is to enhance sound mind in a sound body. The Context Providing physical and mental health care and maintaining healthy physique through a wide spread public health approach, including advocacy and prevention arethe main key functions of Health Centre. The teachers inculcate in the minds of students personal hygiene and several health practices. Many students kept coming to college without taking regular breakfast. Teachers felt the adverse impact of this practice in the first hour of the classroom. They developed headache and other discomforts. Some students had routine sickness disabling them from classroom concentration. Girls specially had regular discomforts. Sports injury, minor injuries during walk from the bus stop to college, etc. warranted the establishment of a health centre. The Management established the Fitness Centre or Gymnasium on 21st December 2011and the fullfledged Health Centre on 2nd July 2012. The Practice There is a provision to check blood sugar level and blood pressure free of cost. General check up is given to the students once in three months. Horlicks is given to women students, teaching and nonteaching staff during their pregnancy period. Special care is given to them. Fruits and biscuits are provided to them in alternate days. The health center of our college provides free medicines. Medical counselling is given to all the students and the teaching staff when it is necessary. Facilities available at the Health Centre: • Height and weight measurements • Glucometer • Blood Pressure Apparatus • Nebulizer Machine for easy breathing • Administration of Intravenous fluid (Glucose and MJ injection) to students who suddenly suffer from loss of energy. • The centre also buys generic medicine through "Jan Aushad" a nearby Central Government funded medical shop • Pulse Oximeter • Mini Refrigerator To strengthen the physical fitness and good health of the students the college has Gym facility. The Gymnasium is well equipped with gadgets to improve physique and give corrective measures for reducing obesity and to maintain physical fitness. It is well equipped with a trainer. The Health Centre functions from 8.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on all working days. The Gymnasium functions from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. on all working days. Separate time has been earmarked for girls. The Gymnasium is being used by teachers also. Male students who regularly practice in the fitness centre have also participated in physique display competitions. Facilities available at the Fitness Centre: • Multi Gym 6 Stations • Multi Gym 4 Stations • Seated Calf Bench • Dumbells Rack with Imported Dumbells (35kg) • Multipurpose bench • Stretch Machine • Dual Twister • Stepper Sharp Power • Stadio Meter • Sit up Bench • Tread mill • Elliptical Trainer • Weight Lifting set Health and Fitness Club under Part V is functioning in tandem with the two centres. Evidence of Success: A qualified nurse looks after the health centre. She provides immediate health care and if required refers them to nearby hospital or to the parent hospital, Vikram Hospital. Both male and female students get benefits for their habitual and occasional ailments. The health centre record shows regular inflow of both male and female students. Health Centre provides 1. Clean and hygienic bed rest facility 2. First aid treatment at site (classroom) during emergency 3. During sports and games the Health Centre service is available on the spot 4. Free monthly dosage of medicine to a few chronic patients 5. Mini Refrigerator The Health and Fitness Club have organized health camps separately for both gender more than 800 girls and more than 1000 boys every year benefiting which ensure that the

club promotes health for all. Memorandum of understanding was also done with Vickram Hospital and established separate medical unit inside our campus. Problems Encountered and Resources Required The demands on health centers are greater and more complex than ever. More students visit the health centrewith significant health needs, including mental health challenges. And many need help in managing serious conditions like asthma, eating disorders, injuries and physical disabilities. As our demand increases, increasing the bed facility is recommended. Large space and separate rooms for boys and girls are also required. For some students physical ailments are a manifestation of depression they are unable to cope with. So a regular counselor or a clinical psychologist is an immediate requirement. This matter has been referred to the Management. At the moment teachers from Social Work Department with specializations in mental health guidance carry out this work.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

A thrust area of the college for the last five years had been the upgradation of the college with autonomy and also with potential for excellence and for the last three years had been the entry to National Institutional Ranking Framework. Of these, autonomy was a priority as it gives the college a unique status in academic advancement. Our college took the lead in 2014. Autonomy is our dream project undertaken jointly by Management, teaching and nonteaching staff for furtherance of tertiary education in Madurai city and its surroundings. The institution has phenomenal role for the past 40 years. By introducing Autonomy, new syllabus can be introduced with learning objectives, curriculum and ICT Learning. The Principal convened a meeting 13.02.2015 to discuss the need for opting for Autonomy. Unanimous decision was taken at this meeting to initiate preparation for Autonomy. Autonomy proposal was submitted on 30.09.2014 to UGC through Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. The UGC constituted a Committee to visit our college. Expert committee visited our college on 10.3.2015 to evaluate the performance and academic attainments of our college for grant of autonomous status. The college received a copy of letter from Joint Secretary UGC on 29.04.2015 recommending autonomous status to the college for a period of Six years w.e.f 2015 to 2021. Madurai Kamaraj University decided to confer Fresh Autonomous Status to our college and communication to that effect was received on 22.06.2015. Various statutory bodies and Committees such as Board of Studies, Academic Council, Governing Body, Autonomy Grants, Deans and COE, Academic and Administrative Audits were constituted as per the Guidelines for Autonomous Colleges during the Twelfth Plan Period to carry out the academic activities. At present, college has completed four years successfully. The first batch of autonomous P.G. Programme students came out in June 2017 and the first batch of autonomous U.G. Programme students came out in June 2018. UGC has been releasing an annual grant of Rs. 20,00,000/ towards the efficient implementation of autonomy. These grants facilitate academic departments in organizing conferences and workshops. Grants are also utilized to strengthen the infrastructure of the institution. Autonomy could function efficiently due to the coordination between COE and Deans. The office of the COE executes the tasks like setting questions based on the syllabus submitted by the office of the Deans. Changes effected in the syllabus through special Board of Studies subsequently approved by the Academic Council are faithfully communicated to the office of the COE. As per the requirements of NAAC, Academic Audit is conducted for each department. A competent external examiner is invited as expert. Syllabi, research activities, publications and programmes organized are audited. Detailed evaluatory report of each department has been submitted to IQAC through Principal. There are two Evaluation Halls and spacious offices for COE and the Deans and another for Superintendent of Examinations. Software mechanism is capable of meeting the requirement of Autonomy for another 10 years. Results are published within three weeks from the last date of Summative Examinations.
